## 1. INTRODUCTIONS, WELCOME AND SAFETY MOMENT

Alberta Municipal Health and Safety Association's Program Evaluation Manager, Shannon Thomas, welcomed everyone, introduced herself, and called the meeting to order at 10:05 am. Members, guests, and staff introduced themselves.

The Health and Safety moment on Fire Safety was presented by Carla Smith of AMHSA. Please see attached PowerPoint for details.

Shannon Thomas reviewed housekeeping items.

#### 2. PARTNERSHIPS UPDATE AND AMHSA COR UPDATE

#### Miranda McLay – Government of Alberta, Partnerships Update

Ms. McLay presented the Partnerships update (attached in the PowerPoint) which included the following topics:

#### **2019 Workplace Provincial Summary**

- Summary of injuries, illnesses, and fatalities is available on the website. Data from 2019 but valuable for safety meetings, etc.
- Municipal government is linked under the same category as provincial government, education, and health care.

#### **OHS Act Changes**

#### **Changes to COR Audit**

- Due to legislation changes, there will need to revise the content standard.
- This will lead to changes in the COR audit tool as well as the SECOR audit tool.
- Updates will be made to health and safety management system training and auditor training.

Ms. McLay thanked everyone for their feedback on the Code review. Changes to the Act will come out in the fall. There could be more changes coming in 2022 that are not related to the Act. No further information is available due to the review of all the survey responses.

**Question**: As far as audit document revisions go, will there be lead time to make changes? Ms. McLay indicated that there will be a time period where standards are updated. The audit tool will

be revised by the Certifying Partners. It takes about a year for everything to be put into place for the whole process. Shannon added that the last time there was an audit tool change, it happened very fast. In other instances, there has been a year to allow for retraining auditors once training and audit tools are updated. The provincial subcommittee tasked with revising the content standard and protocol has not yet been formed.

**Question**: This is so much work for municipalities to go through. Is there really value in this, given that if there is a change in the next government, they will probably change it all back? Ms. McLay responded that Partnerships is working with CPs on how to make the audit tool less prescriptive and processed based so that changes are not required as frequently. Ms. McLay will be chairing the subcommittee which will be focused on the standard not being so prescriptive/tied to specifics in the legislation.

## Shannon Thomas, Program Evaluation Manager – AMHSA Auditing.

**Question**: Would following the ISO standard remove the need for constant change due to the Alberta Government legislative changes? Executive Director Hrynchuk indicated that being ISO certified would not replace the need to keep health and safety management systems current regarding provincial legislation.

Paul Shields from the City of Calgary shared that the City is aligning its OHSMS with ISO 45001 and undertaking a review, but maintaining the evaluation of the management system using the AMHSA COR audit.
